On the 2nd of February 2017 at the first general meeting the AAA constitution was agreed and an interim committee of nine volunteers was voted in to steer the AAA's activities until its first AGM in September 2017 – and here we are!

Going forward the interim committee focussed on 'Bringing the stars closer to home' which it began to fulfil through a set of objectives which continue to underpin all that the association does. These are;

1. To promote and advance public education in the science of Astronomy and related branches of research;

- **6.** With the support of West Suffolk/Borough/Town Councils instigate and encourage the restoration of, and access to, the Athenaeum observatory and Telescope.

In support of these objectives we have as a new association achieved a great deal during our brief history of time. We have;

- Established a constitution
- Formed an interim committee
- Met fortnightly for observations and presentations
- Created a web site and a presence on social media
- Become a member of the Federation of Astronomical Societies
- Published a members handbook
- Hosted our first star party in partnership with SEBC and will be hosting a further two nights next month
- Had our first members excursion, a trip to the Greenwich Observatory
- Supported OASI at their special event as they celebrated an amazing 50 years
